Indication

KEVEYIS (dichlorphenamide) is a prescription drug used to treat primary hyperkalemic periodic paralysis, primary hypokalemic periodic paralysis, and other similar diseases.

Important Safety Information

- Do not take KEVEYIS if you:
 - Have liver or severe lung disease
 - Are allergic to dichlorphenamide or other sulfa drugs
 - Are taking high doses of aspirin
- Discontinue KEVEYIS at the first appearance of skin rash, swelling, difficulty breathing, or any other unexpected side effect or reaction
- KEVEYIS can cause your body to lose potassium, can cause acid buildup, and can increase your risk of falls. The risk of falls and acid buildup are greater in elderly patients
- The most common side effects are feeling of tingling or prickling (“pins and needles”) in your toes, feet, and hands and fingers; trouble with memory or thinking; unpleasant taste in the mouth; and feeling confused
- Before taking KEVEYIS, tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, medical conditions, and if you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant
